

From Strong City, 7 miles east or from Emporia, 10 miles west on US Hwy 50. Go north on Z Rd for one mile, turn left (west) on 240 Road, continue for two miles. At X Road, turn right (north), approximately 3.5 miles to the site entrance.

TREAD LIGHTLY

- Bring a refillable water bottle.
- Pack out what you bring in, including trash and recyclables.
- When necessary, use recycling containers.
- Carpool

BE PREPARED

- This remote location requires driving on gravel. Making your way
 from parking to the main site includes walking on the natural terrain
 of the pasture. Please plan accordingly.
- Upon arrival, allow up to one hour to access main event site.
- · Wear comfortable closed-toe walking shoes.
- The picturesque walking trail is the best way to access the main event site. If needed, transportation options are available: golf cart rides from the parking area to the Wait & Ride wagons to the ticket gate at the main event site. Expect long lines.

- Valid ID for Alcohol Wristband


DO NOT BRING
